
"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times." So wrote Charles Dickens as the first line of "A Tale of Two Cities." That phrase characterized for me our Diocesan experience of Cursillo in Niagara in April 2013.

"It was the best of times." Weekend # 48, at which I was privileged to be one of the Spiritual Advisors, introduced 22 participants to Cursillo. This was the biggest group in many years which seemed to be reflected in the volume of enthusiasm within the weekend group and also the support community. We witnessed The Closing as a breath of new life for Cursillo in Niagara and Huron Dioceses.

"It was the worst of times." Immediately following Weekend # 48, we learned of the sudden, tragic death of David Hoover, one of Weekend # 48 participants. Great joy was replaced by deep grief as we found ourselves grappling for understanding and hope, seeking God's guidance in a situation we had never anticipated. I would like to thank Bishop Michael Bird and Archdeacon Michael Patterson for their empathy, concern and support for the Cursillo community during that difficult time.

Despite the sadness of David's passing, hope has reigned throughout the past year. The Weekend reunion Ultreya held April 28, pre-organized by Wendy Beresford who had to be absent herself, was well attended. Ultreyas have flourished in Acton/Milton, Guelph and at the diocesan level. In June Cursillistas in the southern part of the diocese from Ft. Erie to Niagara –on-the-Lake to Grimsby met for an Ultreya and potluck at Grace Church, St. Catharines. Those who met that day expressed a strong desire to plan future Ultreyas in the region. Travel distances may be up to 30 minutes. That did not seem unreasonable as those who attend in Guelph travel from as far as Shelburne and Brantford for their gatherings. We continue to work towards the goal of restarting regular Ultreyas in the Hamilton area.

As Spiritual Director, it is part of my job to encourage clergy to attend Cursillo. Two clergy expressed interest in a presentation to their parish in 2012. One followed through but experienced a conflict with Weekend # 48 dates and a major local event. I am finding that letters and application forms sent to churches are not getting the exposure that we might hope to have. In 2013/2014 I hope we can develop eye catching posters and ensure information is always available in as many parishes as possible. Clergy have expressed to me that it is difficult to clear a weekend to go to Cursillo. I would like to see us work towards providing supply clergy to enable clergy to participate in weekends where back up does not

exist. I will continue to share with clergy the value I see in having Cursillistas in my parish. They are the leaven in the dough. Minutes of the Annual General Meeting Held Sunday, September16th 2012 Holy Trinity Church, Hamilton at 3:00pm

Call to order

Carol Summers, Lay Director and Chair called the meeting to order at 3:20 p.m. and welcomed everyone. Rev. Stephanie Pellow led the opening prayer.

2. Welcome

Carol asked if everyone had signed the attendance record. All 20 people in attendance signed the sheet.

3. Minutes of the previous AGM

MOTION: Marion Bailey/Tim Timbers "that the minutes of the September 11th 2011 Annual General Meeting, as published in the Rainbow and amended, be accepted." - CARRIED

4. The Lay Director's Report – submitted by Carol Summers

Although all reports were published in the September Rainbow, Carol decided that the reports would be read since not everyone in attendance had read the September Rainbow. Carol read the Lay Director's Report.

There have been 7 meetings of Secretariat over the past year. Carol explained that although there were no elections this year that Shirley Kitchen (Weekend Chair) and John Newton (Communications Chair) would be completing their final terms of office and that individuals were needed to fill these roles. If anyone was interested or knew of anyone who might be interested they were encouraged to contact any of the Secretariat members. Carol explained the length of office for the positions on Secretariat.

5. The Spiritual Director's Report – submitted by Rev. Stephanie Pellow

Stephanie read her report. One idea which Stephanie took from the Triennial Meeting was that we will not be able to attract younger people if we are always reminiscing and looking back. We need to be more youthful in outlook; to plan and look ahead with the kind of optimism that says the glass is half full rather than half empty.

6. Committee Reports from Secretariat were all published in the September Rainbow.

a) Huron Report – submitted by Marion Bailey and Jess Johnstone

Report was read by Marion Bailey. Awareness of Cursillo in Huron Diocese has been raised with two successful Ultreyas which were well attended.

Marion has the Cursillo display board for promotional activity in Huron.

b) Communications Report - submitted by John Newton

Report was read by Wendy Beresford for John since he was not in attendance. Nothing further was added to the report.

c) Weekend Chair Report – submitted by Shirley Kitchen

Report was read by Nyle Armstrong for Shirley since she was not in attendance. Nothing further was added to the report.

MOTION: Gary Van Kooten/Renee Anderson

"that the reports as written and published in the Rainbow be accepted." CARRIED

Carol was very pleased to announce that Shirley Kitchen would be the Weekend #48 Coordinator. Weekend #48 will be held April 11-14th, 2013 at Mount Mary in Ancaster.

7. Treasurer's Report for 2011/2012 and Budget for 2012/2013

Carol Summers gave an overview of the statements in Deanna Ross' absence.

Carol explained that due to Deanna's illness that Carol had the financial documents in her possession for part of the year. Now that Deanna is feeling better, she is resuming her duties as Treasurer beginning with the Treasurer's Report.

a) Financial Statement

The left column reflects expenses over the past year and the right column is the budgeted expenses for this coming year.

The amount for the Triennial Conference is misleading (\$738) The actual cost to Cursillo was \$439.00 (\$299 for registration plus \$140 for gas). Stephanie and Carol each paid half of their costs as Cursillo would pay the costs for only for one person, the voting member, to attend and they felt it was important for both Lay and Spiritual Director to be at the Conference.

Carol agreed that some confusion may arise because the expenses were not broken down in the budget. Gary Van Kooten asked what the balance was in the bank since that number did not appear on the Financial Statement. As of the end of August there was \$8680.56 in the account.

b) Budget

Rev. Stephanie brought it to our attention that the next Triennial Conference would be held in Newfoundland. With this in mind Tim Timbers suggested that a third of the projected amount be budgeted over the next 3 years. Sharon Insley made a motion

MOTION: Sharon Insley/TerryCousineau "that the amount of \$400 per year over the next 3 years be budgeted for the next Triennial Conference held in Newfoundland" All in favour – no abstentions CARRIED

Gary Van Kooten wanted clarification on funds for CACS. What if the amount of \$400 was not enough to send our representative? Since the next Triennial is not for three years it was agreed that there would be time to address that issue at other AGM's.

Sharon Insley inquired if there would be an increase in the cost of the Weekend since Weekend #48 will be held in the manor at Mount Mary. Marion and Larry indicated that the amount will stay the same as the previous year since this was all booked in advance.

MOTION: Tim Timbers/Gary Van Kooten

"that the Budget for 2012/2013 as amended be accepted" All in favour – no abstentions CARRIED 8) **Positions on Secretariat**

As mentioned earlier this is Shirley Kitchen's (Weekend Chair) and John Newton's (Communications Chair) last term and that we will need replacements. Communications Chair needs to be web-familiar and knowledgeable about producing newsletters.

Everyone on Secretariat will be finishing their second year and will be asked if they will be staying on. Larry Collinson pointed out that the correct procedure would be to still elect them and have them voted in again.

9. Other Business and Announcements

a) 30 Year Anniversary of Niagara Cursillo

This year will mark 30 years since the first Weekend in Niagara was conducted (March 17-20, 1983). Carol asked for ideas in planning a celebration. Larry made the motion

MOTION: Larry Collinson/Donna Cousineau "that a committee to make plans for 30 year celebrations be formed" - CARRIED

Larry also showed us two booklets titled "Cursillo: the first 10 years" and "Cursillo: the next 10 years" which highlighted pictures and information regarding all the Weekends during those time periods. We need another to cover the past 10 years. He said that this would be a nice project for the committee to undertake.

Carol explained that this committee would need to communicate to Secretariat what their plans were.

b) Announcements

Stephanie made an announcement that Leader's School would be held on Saturday, November 10, 2012. This was for anyone who was interested in being on the team for the next Weekend or in the future. Attendance to be strongly encouraged.

10) The meeting was adjourned at 4:25 pm. Stephanie Pellow led us in prayer.

Following the meeting there was an Ultreya with Eucharist and a potluck dinner.

Lay Director's Report

I must begin by thanking the members of Secretariat for their work and support of Cursillo during the past year. It has been wonderful getting to know these people you wisely voted into leadership positions. Secretariat appointed Larry Collinson to the Continuing Education chair as that position was open. Larry brings years of experience and knowledge to the role which is greatly appreciated. We held our regular meetings at Holy Trinity, Hamilton, thanks to David Toth who is Rector there. Secretariat held seven formal meetings during the past year and we have had many discussions through email. This edition of the Rainbow contains reports from the various "chairs" which will describe the work which has been done during the past year.

There are no elections necessary this year, however this will be Shirley Kitchen's final year as Weekend Chair and John Newton is also in his final term as Communications Chair, so we will be looking for people to fill those roles. If you are interested in either of these positions, or know someone who is, or might be, please talk to any member of Secretariat, we would be delighted to discuss it.

Rev. Stephanie Pellow and I went to Ottawa for the Triennial Conference. The speaker, Rev. Charles Owens, has a huge church in South Carolina. He talked about the Weekend, pointing out the significance of everything we do as he unfolded the Weekend for us. Sometimes we get so caught up in all the details we miss the overall design. He made various points which we will bring to the discussions as we plan the next Weekend.

Elections to the Canadian Anglican Cursillo Secretariat were held during the conference and I was elected as one of the two members from Ontario, the other one coming from Ottawa. Our first meeting takes place in Halifax in October and I look forward to working with the other members from across the country.

Over the past year I have been asked quite regularly where I get the energy to do this work and also fulfill my other commitments, which were keeping me very busy before this role popped onto to "To Do" list. I cannot take the credit. I am most definitely not a superwoman but simply one who follows the Lord's leading. I trust that God will not give me more than I can handle. Enthusiasm helps too. I am by nature enthusiastic. I was always caught up by things that were of interest to me and was raised to believe that "if a thing is worth doing, it's worth doing well." I thought I might grow out of this tendency towards enthusiasm as I matured and, I assumed, became more sophisticated but it appears that I am not going to become "cool"!

So, maybe being enthusiastic is not such a bad thing after all. The sophisticated world may look down on enthusiastic people but God inspires them, the Oxford English Dictionary even says so!

In this past year I have met many Cursillistas, on Secretariat, at Ultreyas, funerals, the Weekend, and at the Triennial Conference in Ottawa. I am struck by the similarities in the individual stories, diverse though they are. I saw people moved to tears, to great joy and thankfulness for what had happened in their lives. They had all attended a Weekend, some were very reluctant to do so, but God had reached deeply into their lives and wakened them to His presence. Their lives were enriched beyond measure. The changes in their commitment to God and the Church were profound. They were enthusiastic, in the best sense of the word.

So as we look back at the past year and forward to the beginning of another year – our thirtieth- of Cursillo in Niagara, know that we are spending our time and energy on something worthwhile, which produces results. Keep up the good work, spread the news, our God is alive and well and working through Cursillo. Don't be ashamed to be enthusiastic, it's a gift given for us to use so that we may have the energy, and find the time, to do His work.

Spiritual Director's Report

As I write this report for our Annual Meeting in September, I have just returned from a month at a cottage on Lake Simcoe. I feel rested and refreshed by a time spent close to nature and in the company of good friends and family members. It is hard to soak up this feeling and keep the memory close through the other eleven months of the year when things can be more active and exciting but also hectic and harried. However, I can rely on other times of refreshment that are the gifts of our loving Creator. There is the Sabbath rest; the time when God calls us apart to rest, pray, clear our heads and focus on the wonder of life on earth. There is also the rest and refreshment that we have in our Cursillo method: time for reflection in the company of a trusted small group and Ultreya to encourage and uphold us. Since our meeting last September, our Secretariat and Cursillistas have been active in planning and holding events to encourage each of us to invite others to explore their faith through Cursillo. We held a successful Day of Deeper Understanding in October 2011. Although we were not able to enjoy the contributions of a native drummer as planned, we had opportunities to deepen our spiritual lives and learn new skills through Rev. Brian Galligan's presentation on "Lectio Divina" and the Listening Skills Workshop. Watch for a Leaders' School day being planned for later this year.

The Diocesan Ultreyas were well planned, enjoyable and helpful. Thank you to all who gave witness talks and responses as well as our musicians and organizers. We are happy to report that regional Ultreyas have continued in Milton/Acton, Oakville and Guelph. Ultreyas have now been held in Huron Diocese and are being planned for Fort Erie. We are working towards the goal of restarting regular Ultreyas in the Hamilton.

Our Secretariat has been able to communicate effectively with our Diocesan Resource Centre personnel so that our mailings are distributed through the diocesan system and notices can be posted to the diocesan website more easily. Those responsible for congregational development are suggesting Cursillo to parish leaders. I have also contacted clergy by mail, at meetings and informal gatherings. Weekend # 47 in May introduced new participants to Cursillo. The group was small but we had a sense of the Spirit working mightily among us over the weekend.
