From Our Lay Director Carol Summers Director's Direction

I am sitting here with my window open wide listening to the birds singing. Following Christ Passionately We

Last summer some of the members of our past and present Secretariat met with Bishop Michael Bird at Cathedral Place. We gathered to talk about the role of Cursillo within the Diocesan plan that we call our Vision. You are likely quite familiar with the five initiatives that are referred to as the "petals" because the diagrammatic representation of the Vision looks somewhat like a flower.

Just for a quick review, the five main areas of initiative, in random order, are:

- Life Changing Worship
- Outstanding Leadership for Ministry
- Continuous Culture of Innovation
- Prophetic Social Justice Making
- Generous Culture of Stewardship



Each of the petals represents an important facet of the ministry of not only the diocese but also each church congregation and individual Anglican in those churches. The petals segments are arranged in a circle and are of equal size for a reason. Although we have concentrated on certain initiatives in some years, they are all equally valuable initiatives for the growth of our ministry in Niagara.

The petal statements are important but absolutely central is the statement in the middle of the circle of petals; "Following Christ passionately we pursue excellence, practice justice and grow." To narrow it down even more, I believe that everything hinges on the first part of that statement – "Following Christ passionately." Passion implies a depth of emotion and commitment, dedication and single-mindedness. Passion is often associated with words like "fire," "burning" and "desire." "Passion" is a word loaded with meaning. It cannot be luke-warm or limited.

"Passion" is at the very turning point of true conversion. We may be loyal church attendees, helpful parishioners, interested in learning the way of Christian living, helpful to our neighbours, practicing hospitality and justice and doing many other things in keeping with the Christian faith and still not quite be the followers that Christ has called us to be. We can be doing all the right things in a perfunctory way or we may even be doing all the right things because we have a passion for the initiatives themselves and still not quite be the followers that Christ has called us to be. Think of the passion that Jesus inspired in his disciples. They wanted to spend every moment with him. They left their families and friends, they left their home towns, and they left their jobs just to be with him. Jesus taught them to be like him in the way they interacted with others in love, in the way they taught others about the wonder of God and in the way they encouraged others to model their way of living. There was passion in all of it. It was not just a project, no twelve step plan but rather a passionate way of living, in love with God who was the first to love and poured that passion into

creation and into reaching out to establish relationship with humankind. It is when the fire of the Holy Spirit inspires us with that sort of "passion," that we can truly be converted to follow Christ in the way in which Jesus called us to follow him.

Our Diocesan Vision hinges on "following Christ passionately." This is where I believe Cursillo can make the greatest contribution. The Cursillo weekend and follow through activities help to open a person up to the Holy Spirit. Other Cursillistas provide both a model of how to follow Christ passionately and they encourage others to do so in love and with the security of acceptance. In Cursillo we learn not to fear "passion" but to embrace it to allow ourselves to freely become passionate followers of Christ not only in al that we do but in all that we are. We never need to apologize for what we have to offer in Christ's name. Christ's passion and our passion are at the centre of everything.

Following Christ passionately wecan do more than we can ask and imagine.

It has been my experience that the gift of giving Palanca is sometimes even more rewarding and there are many ways to give

Palanca each and every day on our Christian journey. We have received many a "thank you" for written Palanca sent from our Secretariat to weekend committees around the world.
