Where is God's grace working in your life? Take a moment to glance at that rear-view mirror we know as our memory and take note of what God has done or has been doing over the last little while. What do you see?

As we embark upon another year, we ask God to reveal His purpose for our lives and particularly, the Cursillo program as it sets sail toward its first duo diocese Cursillo weekend at the end of May. You can find out more about this in another part of this edition of The Rainbow. Where has God been active lately? In Paul's letter to the Ephesians, he reminds us that "through grace we have been saved by faith" (2:8) and pointedly continues, that "it is not the result of [our] own efforts, but God's gift" (2:9).

Let's return to the initial question. What difference does Christ make in your everyday life?

Is it the sudden awareness of God's beauty in nature as you walk along complaining about the cold, blustery winter wind? Is it the 'sudden' (I think not) change of heart of a friend toward a prickly part of her relationship with a person she has been complaining about? Or is it the courage to have that conversation with a loved one about an annoying behaviour that you feel disrespects God? For me and the friends that I group with, it is some of these things and more.

Who do I group with? God has placed in my life through the mere randomness of a parish population several people with whom I have a deep and lasting affection and connection through Cursillo. We were friends long before we formed the Cursillo connection. Just like the slogan says, be a friend and bring a friend, these people came to Cursillo because God was working in their lives long before I asked them to attend. Through big and little ways, God had been calling them to dive deeper, go further, and come closer. It was not my friendship, nor my persistent prayers nor the faith-sharing moments that 'made' them go to Cursillo. My actions, my good deeds, did not have this effect. As I reflect upon those years and months before they said "yes" to going to Cursillo, it was God's grace working in me and through me that accounts for their response. But more so, it was through the words, the prayers and the casual 'coincidental' conversations with others belonging to the Wider Community around them that God provided the 'right' moment for them to respond. God surrounded them with people, and with incidents to bring them to their awareness of His Grace in their lives. God's Spirit inspired them to 'connect the dots', to take the next step toward what they sensed was a good, faith-based decision to intensify their relationship with God.

The friends I group with take risks. We work hard to practice our Faith, to regularly Study religious or inspirational texts and to plan Apostolic Action. Just like me, they also struggle, sometimes failing but nevertheless always trying. For me, the important part is that we do this together. We rely on one another and God's Spirit working in us to do more than we can ask or imagine. Through us and sometimes, in spite of us, God sends us the people and the incidents in our lives to remind us that we are loved and we are God's forever.

This is the unimaginable greatness and goodness of God's gift of love to us in His Son, Jesus Christ. At our baptism we are stamped, we are marked as God's special child, an Inheritor of the kingdom of Heaven. We become a Member of Christ, a part of the Body of Christ, the one part of the body that is important to the whole body so that the other parts are able to function. That's who we are and that's why it is important to be connected to others in God's Son, Jesus, through the power of God's Spirit.

What are you doing to walk with Jesus more closely?

You will notice that there is a link to a survey about Grouping included in this edition of The Rainbow. It has also been sent to you electronically before this publication. We are conducting a survey to see how Cursillo can improve its Fourth Day by creating stronger examples of grouping among its members. If we are to claim the promise of our Lord Jesus Christ, we must work with our brothers and sisters to make God more accessible, closer to the world around us.

Please make sure you fill out the survey and submit or call your results to the people on our Education committee. With your input, we can strengthen the bonds that tie us together in our Lord Jesus Christ and make the Kingdom of Heaven just a little bit closer for everyone to enjoy.

As many of you know, ordained ministry was not my first calling in life. I trained as a teacher and taught primary and junior age children for thirty years before I attended seminary. I recall having a problem with "compartmentalizing." By that I mean that when I was at the school I was totally immersed in the tasks and the interactions of the job. I found it extremely hard to pick up the phone to make an appointment with a health care professional, my mechanic or hair stylist. Those were home tasks and I was not at home.

After I attended a Cursillo when I was 29, while I continued to have difficulty

integrating the secular aspects of my life into my work day, I found that integrating my faith into my work came rather easily. I thought about my teaching as part of the apostolic action. Kindness, patience, fairness, joy, caring and encouraging were well integrated into my days working with children. Of course teaching is an obvious career for practicing those fruits of the Spirit. Jesus welcomed the children. Following the way of Jesus involved welcoming children on an everyday basis. It included the necessity of putting the other first. The children in your charge need to be your first concern. The commandment to love your neighbour was highlighted as well. Working closely with children was a "neighbourly" activity. You were a part of their community and they of yours. I don't think anyone can teach successfully unless they love being with children in general and love those in their charge in particular.

While teaching provides immediately recognizable opportunities for Christian action, most likely all occupations have some venues for interaction in the way in which Christ taught us. In the later years of my teaching career, I routinely bought my gas at a station on route to my school. The young man who pumped the gas (Remember those days?) was cheerful and enthusiastic about the day ahead even on the coldest of February mornings. He expressed care for and interest in his customers without being obtrusive. Over time I got to know that his father had bought the station and asked him to manage it even though he had to suspend his education to do so. He was a Christian and had wanted to study theology possibly leading to a career in ministry. Kevin asked a colleague of mine who taught grade 7 & 8 to help him with teaching techniques for his Sunday school class. I admired Kevin both because he did such a fine job of extending Christian hospitality and because he had sacrificed his own plans to help out his family.

Eventually Kevin was no longer at the gas station and I missed seeing him, a friend in Christ known only in a few brief conversations. In my last year of seminary, I was delighted to encounter him at the beginning of term in one of my classes. We had a lovely reunion. He caught me up on the news of his young family. I shared what I was doing in retirement and gathered greetings for Steve who had helped him out with the Sunday school lessons. It was a one day reunion as Kevin decided not to take that class and I did not run into him again at the college. I have not forgotten his wonderful example of taking his faith into a job that could otherwise have been unrewarding and using it to bring cheer to others.

In each of our occupations, volunteer work, church functions, and even retail interactions how have we strived to make that the moment when someone else felt closest to Christ that week?



But Jesus immediately said to them: "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid." "Lord, if it's you," Peter replied, "tell me to come to you on the water." "Come," he said. Then Peter got down out of the boat, walked on the water and came toward Jesus. But when he saw the wind, he was afraid and, beginning to sink, cried out, "Lord, save me!" Immediately Jesus reached out his hand and caught him. "You of little faith," he said, "why did you doubt?" And when they climbed into the boat, the wind died down. Then those who were in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

I am amazed – once again – by the Holy Spirit!! My journey towards Weekend #51 has made me realize how much like Peter I am – boldly stepping out and then, like Thomas, doubting – doubting my decisions, my reasons, my actions. I find it so easy to tell others to "have faith" or "trust God" and "keep your eye on Christ": but it is something different to remind myself in times of uncertainty. I wonder: Is this merely a human condition?

I have been walking with a woman with whose friendship I have been blessed. Over the past year and a half, we have mostly laughed together. Our first meeting – our first discussion - immediately revealed we had much in common. Not like me, she is very brave but, like me, she loves to study the bible – especially John. What an amazing relationship we have developed as she gives witness to anyone and everyone of how her pain subsides after prayer and how much better she feels after having communion. What joy I find to watch our God at work! We often go back to Matthew 14. Then as we part ways and she returns to her abode and me to mine -- then my doubts step in.... What if......I wonder if.....I hope that.....She tells me that this is the same for her. We weep.

It seems to me that we can't always see Christ in the turbulence and unsettled waters. He reminds us that if we ask His reply is – "take courage! Don't be afraid". He encourages us to step out of the boat and into the uncertainty. Even when we doubt and become afraid, He is there for us immediately. And when the wind is calm we can worship Him saying "Truly you are the Son of God".

In prayer I asked God for a theme for this weekend. I asked for some scripture to guide me. There was silence – nothing immediate that I could hear. Little did I know that His response was contrary. He was also working through my grandchildren who gifted me with a t-shirt for my birthday celebration at the A&W in Orangeville at 6pm on a Friday evening. The t-shirt reads "Lifesaver – mine walks on water". A coincidence??? I think not!! I take comfort in knowing that Cursillo has a method and our team doesn't have to invent the wheel.
