1. <u>Lay Director</u> (Susan Little)

The 2017-18 program year has been a banner year! We all have heard this promise but sometimes we forget that God promises to be with us always. (Matthew 28:20) In our baptism, God seals the promise of His eternal love for us. How we access this promise from God depends on the relationship we have with our Lord. And how we can exercise this relationship is what Cursillo is all about.

God blessed us in Niagara Huron Cursillo over the past year. Here is some of the evidence.

Niagara Huron Cursillo held Cursillo Weekend 53 in October 2017 and the plans for Weekend 54 are well underway. Thanks go to Renee Anderson and Colin Shutt and to Karen Galligan and Susanne Adams, respectively, for their outstanding work as Co-ordinators. The Ignatius Centre in Deemerton has been a recent jewel we have discovered for our Weekends. In addition, we hosted the Triennial National Anglican Cursillo Conference in June of 2018, welcoming over a hundred people from different Cursillo groups all across Canada. Our key note speaker throughout the weekend was the Primate, Archbishop Fred Hiltz, who inspired us to follow the example of St. Peter as a follower, friend, and disciple of Jesus. His wit, humility and lively involvement in our program made the Triennial theme

"Behold, I am doing a new thing" (Isaiah 43:19) come alive. He sent us back into the places from which we had come rejoicing. And as I recollect the closing to the Triennial, the words from the song "Trees of the Field" based on Psalm 96: 12, continue to echo "You shall go out with joy... and all the trees of the field will clap their hands."

Niagara Huron Cursillo has also sponsored some special events this year. Early in 2017, Shirley Kitchen as Education Chair directed a Day of Deeper Understanding in Waterloo. In spite of the bad storm which grew during the day, two witness talks and a video about discerning God's presence in our lives helped those attending to grow further and deeper in their relationships with Jesus Christ. One Diocesan Ultreya in early March saw an usual number of people reconnecting with Cursillo attend the potluck and praise service. Then, as the end of June, when most people were preparing for Canada Day celebrations, our Niagara Huron Cursillo hosted an Ultreya at the Cathedral in Hamilton. Bishop Rob Hardwick from the Diocese of Qu'appelle was our witness speaker because he was on his cross-Canada cycling tour and 'coincidentally' was passing through the Hamilton area on that evening. We were graced with his visit, especially when both he and his wife taught us a song about unity and peace as we concluded the Ultreya.

The year has also seen progress in the project on Sponsorship led by Blair Richardson which began mid-summer in 2017. Blair is scheduled to present a preliminary report to Secretariat in the fall of 2018. In his work accessing people's experience of the Cursillo Weekend, he is recording how Cursillo has affected their lives and suggesting which next steps Niagara Huron Cursillo might take. Secretariat's task after this report will be to create strategies to provide such steps for both new and experienced Cursillistas.

Over the past year, God blessed us by simply 'being present' at the important times in the lives of our members. I have been privileged to represent Secretariat in attending funerals and memorial services for our members and their family members. It is always an honour to represent the members who cannot attend and it is a way of affirming that our relationship to Jesus Christ makes us brothers and sisters. As 'family' it is also good to join when the times are good, such as at a celebration of a landmark birthday or milestone in the lives of our members. In the words of a popular song, we "weep when you are weeping. When you laugh, I 'll laugh with you" as we journey through life together.

More evidence come from another memorable event from last year. It occurred when our Spiritual Director, Stephanie Pellow, was made a Canon of Christ Church Cathedral on a stormy night in the fall. However, several of our members travelled a good distance to be present to witness this honour bestowed on our beloved Stephanie. Her dedication to Cursillo is stellar and we are thrilled for Diocesan recognition of her contributions over the years. As a 'body', Cursillo Niagara Huron was present and active in

the process of discernment of a new bishop for Niagara Diocese. From the Meet the Candidates events, to the election itself and followed by the consecration of Bishop Susan Bell, our Cursillo name tags and colourful crosses signal our involvement in the life of the Church at the diocesan level. Furthermore, when Bishop Michael Bird presided at Stephanie's ceremony, he commented on the prevalence of Cursillistas at the event. Making ourselves visible and accessible are key priorities.

As our 2017-18 year concludes, we say good bye and thank you to Kathy She has worked behind the scenes to send cards to our members when significant events occur in their lives. Over the past year she has also worked as Fourth Day Chair with Patti Troughton and has done a good job in pulling together Ultreyas and special events. Thank you, Kathy. At our Annual Meeting scheduled for September 23, 2018, we have only one role to replace and we are hopeful that a very suitable replacement from Huron will be elected. This person will shadow the role which Renee Anderson now leads as Huron Liaison.

We are grateful for the strong role which our Treasurer, Renee Anderson, continues to play on our Secretariat in keeping our books. She did an exemplary task in transferring these skills to the Triennial Committee where as both Registrar and Treasurer, she made the Conference a smooth and successful event. Renee continues to serve as Huron Liaison and she will continue on as our Treasurer. Thank you, Renee.

The program year of 2017-18 has been so successful because of its smoothly functioning Secretariat. We have been gifted with many good people who have stepped forward and offered their gifts to serve Christ and the Church. Each member has done well in their role and contributed to a healthy and productive group.

I am also very thankful for the members of Secretariat fulfilling their roles. I am especially indebted to our Spiritual Director, Stephanie Pellow for her continued dedication and wisdom. We are also proud of our former Secretariat member, Marion Bailey, as the new Chair of CACS, replacing our beloved Carol Summers, our previous Lay Director.

Take, for example, the role which our Communications Chair, James Gould, plays in communicating what Cursillo is doing. 2. <u>Spiritual Director</u>

This past year has found me struggling to be the priest I wanted to be for my parishes and for Cursillo Niagara/Huron. It has found me struggling to be the person I wanted to be for my family and friends. All this was due to a severely arthritic hip that needed to be replaced through the miracle of a prosthetic joint. This was a slow miracle because our hospitals are very busy and wait times are long but it finally happened in late June. I knew I was on a journey through pain and discomfort towards a better time of healing based on the testimony of those who had gone through it before me. It was only towards the end of the journey that I could see that it was very much a spiritual journey as well.

All along, I knew people were holding me in prayer. That was a comfort. All along I saw people around me stepping in when I could not handle simple physical tasks like driving myself to events, needing a chair when others stood or simply carrying a cup of tea to a table. As one who thinks of myself as serving others, I was having to be served. That service was offered with grace and love. It buoyed up my spirit and kept me moving toward the goal of having the surgery. It carried me through waiting, with increasing pain through the extra two months of delay. I give thanks to God for your prayers and help.

After the surgery I was expecting an intense time of recovery promoted by a regimen of exercise as well as rest. It was also the next part of my spiritual journey. With time to pause, I read two books that moved me. The first was "Medicine Walk" by Richard Wagamese, an aboriginal storyteller/writer who unfortunately died too soon to tell us all the stories he had in him. In "Medicine Walk" a young aboriginal man who had been abandoned by his father when his mother died after childbirth, undertakes the task of bringing his father through the back country to the place where he wants to be buried. It is a testy relationship but slowly as he learns his father's story, the young man learns to love and forgive. There are echoes of the story of the prodigal son but the roles are reversed reminding us that we are cast both as the one who needs forgiveness and the one who offers it in life.

The second book I read was "The Promise of Paradox: A Celebration of Contradictions in the Christian Life" by Parker J. Palmer who was a contemporary of Henri Nouwen. Some spiritual seekers are looking for certainty in a time of chaos and uncertainty on our planet. The reading of history tells us this has always been the case although we may see it as peculiar to our time. On the jacket of his book, Parker Palmer writes, "How do we live with the apparent opposition between good and evil, scarcity and abundance, individuality and community, death and new life? We can hold them as paradoxes, not 'either/ors,' allowing them to open our minds and hearts to new ways of seeing and being." This book is a reissue, first released in 1980, which has been tweaked to bring parts up to date. To me it very much spoke of St. Paul's expression of freedom in Christ and as a reminder that faith is not certainty. As St. Paul says, hope is not hope if we can already see what is hoped for. The only certainty we live in is God's love.

The final piece of my spiritual journey was provided by the wonderful people I met while staying at a respite centre to recover. I was able to share the journey with a man who had received a new hip on the same day as myself and with four wonderful women who sat at the table where I ate. Our conversations were wide ranging, sometimes actually touching on our spiritual lives as we shared our stories. It reminded me of the way in which we support, encourage and even teach each other in our Cursillo groups. I was living one of the paradoxes Parker Palmer wrote about. Sometimes I was enjoying my individuality, reading and studying things dear to my heart and at other times I was immersed in community both with the centre's residents and people who came to visit me.

I will remember this past year both as a paradoxical time of difficulty and of joy through which I passed upheld by God's grace offered to me through community and contemplation.

This past fiscal year has been a healthy one for Niagara Huron Cursillo. We continue to be good stewards over the many gifts that are received and were able to plan well. It has enabled sponsorship to assist those who had a desire to attend a Weekend and/or the Triennial Conference. It gave us breathing space in order to host the Triennial to our best ability; with so many Cursillistas from around the country coming to hear many speakers throughout the Conference, hold meetings, and visit with other fellow Cursillistas. We have been blessed with ongoing donations to help make this possible.

Our donations come to us in a few different ways. Of course, there is the usual generous offerings made at the end of a Weekend. We also have "grouping" money that is given whereby groups make a donation to a kitty during their regularly scheduled gatherings, which in turn is given to the treasurer. There are also donations received prior to a Weekend to ensure and encourage attendance of friends.



Your Secretariat has voluntarily taken up a collection at each meeting in the form of a draw for which the proceeds go into the treasury. Thanks to Colin Shutt who inspired this method

of donating to Cursillo a few years ago. The winner receives a gift given by one of the members of Secretariat. In turn, the winner donates the next gift to be given at the following meeting. On average we collect \$55 per meeting towards sponsorship and various expenses we incur.

Ultreya!

The rain is falling gently outside. We are at the family cottage in mid-July. The kids and their families have gone home and it is a bit of quiet that doesn't happen too often. Paul's father would say, "Do you hear that?" "Silence." I am sure we put Paul's parents through quite a lot with cottage visits of our own six children and now eleven grand children living in the area. Life is messy and noisy but sometimes it feels too quiet when the kids have gone. However, a break every now and then is welcome, too. By the time you read this summer will be almost over and we will have had our first Ultreya.

I am recalling how we began our Ultreyas at Grace, Milton again after our previous leader, stepped down and no one would step up to the plate. (Ideally there would be a group of people doing the organizing, maybe three or four.) After a break of many months, Lorrette Shermet and I decided that we missed the Ultreyas and needed to do something about it. That is all it takes, someone to say, "Let's do it." It is hard to go home sometimes. I guess, I want to encourage you if you are in a place that is not holding Ultreyas to pray and ask God what you can do. Ultreyas can be small to start with. The witness talk should be only ten minutes maximum and should focus on one recent time when the speaker has attempted to bring Christ into their environment. It should not be a list of everything that you do for Christ, just one thing and it doesn't even have to have been successful. We often learn from what doesn't work. Talk to your priest about a good time to meet and get it in the bulletin. Ultreyas are often the first connection people have with Cursillo. Information is on line about how to run one with an Ultreya outline that is easy to follow.
