1. Lay Director

the steps we take in Cursillo to build up an awareness of Christ in peoples' lives. With God's help, Cursillo changes our lives. I hear

it often. It has changed my life in many ways.

This is the first newsletter distributed since the Annual Meeting for Niagara Huron Anglican Cursillo on September 22, 2019. It is with humility and great pleasure that I write this article as its Lay Director. I have been embraced with love, hugs, and smiles during the past few months. I am in continued prayer asking God to give us wisdom, understanding, love, and care to those in the wider community and those on Secretariat. To stand on Secretariat is quite a commitment; most stay a term longer than the normal one; it could be two years or four years, but no longer than four. We are grateful for this commitment of so many who have gone before us.



We formed a team for the Recharge Weekend even before the Annual Meeting (AM), our first meeting being held last July, with the inspiration of Susan Little. While some of us probably would have liked more rest in the hot summer months, Susan encouraged us to forge ahead and see what could become of this chance to rekindle our spirits and give "us" time to hear speakers and enjoy workshops of enlightenment. We were delighted when Mount Mary Retreat Centre was available for the March date. Many of us made our Weekend at that facility or have been on team and it was like returning home. Our team was made up of others on Secretariat who shared their knowledge of talents in the community that could offer their gifts to this Weekend—Patti Troughton, Shirley Kitchen, Jan Collinson, Rita Predon, and myself. And we did forge ahead, and they did say "yes" to our invitations. Thanks to all these wonderful people who brought forth their loves, be it prayer beads, Taizé, pilgrimages, gospel storytelling or contemplative prayer. Our keynote speaker was the Rev. Canon Dr. Lizette Larson-Miller, who is an Anglican Priest, Professor and Huron-Lawson Chair at Huron University College of Western Ontario. Lizette followed the theme 'Step by Step' and spoke on Liturgy and Life as One Journey into God. Wow. Truly amazing. She taught us that "liturgy and worship are not exactly the same, liturgy is one way of worshipping." Her talk disclosed that "a life of worship is an active and conscious way of being before God; prayer is always a Godward activity;" gave a list of "the necessary pieces of prayer;" and shared "how are liturgy and life a continuous stream of worship?" These are just a few of the things that were on the Weekend agenda with Lizette. We truly were indeed blessed to have her spend a weekend with us and yes, she did have time for rest and recharging as well!

We have spent quite a few months reaching out to clergy, holding a focus group discussion with the assistance of an outside professional facilitator, gathering information for a report that would eventually be presented to Bishop Susan Bell. We are happy to report we are in the final stages of this process, thanks to Blair Richardson, Rev. Brian Galligan, and Rev. Canon Dr. Dawn Davis.

During our meeting with Bishop Susan in recent weeks, she gave her consent to our proposal to designate the Coordinator of Faith Formation, in Niagara, Rev. Canon Dr. Dawn Davis, as Member-at-Large Liaison to the Bishop. Upon commissioning Dawn will attend our regular meetings and be responsible for effective two-way communication between Niagara Huron Anglican Cursillo, the Bishop, and diocesan staff. This role is separate from our Spiritual Director. As this role takes on specifics, we will work together to ensure the plans and objectives of both organizations are aligned and mutually supportive.

Fr. Brian and I along with the CACS Chair met recently with Bishop Todd Townshend, Bishop of Huron, after waiting for his ordination and consecration to take place in January, coming after the election in October. It was a pleasure to present Cursillo as one method that brings people together in a closer relationship with God. Small group meetings, larger group gatherings (ultreyas), and the weekend concept were introduced and discussed with Bishop Todd along with updates on our progression and work with the Diocese of Niagara. We wish the best for Bishop Todd as he engages with a long "to do" list while assuming this new life of service.

Grouping

Please remember your Fourth Day talk on Group Reunion or Grouping. Group Reunion begins and ends with prayer. Using the Group Reunion card will help to keep the discussion focused on Piety (Faith), Study and Action each discussed separately. The card also helps structure sharing and keeps us on track so that the time together does not become another "get together" to chat. If you have made your Weekend and are not in a Group, please take action, or put this on your list for action and reap the benefits! Think of the friendships you will develop through this method of communication. Think of the educational opportunities you may hear about as your friends share their acts of generosity, kindness, and knowledge. Think of the power of prayer when two or more are gathered! GROUPING IS AN *ACTION* WORD!

2. Spiritual Director Rev. Brian Galligan

I would love to use my column in this edition of the Rainbow to talk about the amazing Cursillo Recharge Weekend that I just attended at Mt Mary, Ancaster from March 6th-8th 2020. Or perhaps I could write about the tremendously positive meetings that I and others have recently had, with Bishop Susan Bell of Niagara and Bishop Todd Townsend of Huron. There is so much support and enthusiasm building up in our two Dioceses about the future of Cursillo as an essential component of faith formation, that I want to shout about it from the mountaintop and cry out to everyone that; "All is well!".

However, all is not well and we are called yet again, to be God's hands, feet and face in a troubled world. As I sit in front of my computer writing this letter, I am acutely aware of the fears of many and of the widespread disruptions to the routines of our regular lives, being created by the gradual worldwide spread, of the Novel Covid-19 virus. Along with having a Rule of Life, being part of a Group Reunion and attending regular Ultreyas, this situation reminds me of the other key component necessary for a Cursillista to faithfully live out their Fourth Day and that is to have a Spiritual Director. As I listen to reports of borders being closed, mass quarantines and scuffles over essential items in grocery stores, all because of the present pandemic, it causes me to reflect on a question that my own Spiritual Director always asks me when I meet with her, "Where do you see God in all of this?"

I wonder if that can best be answered by something sent to me recently via Facebook and that I immediately shared on my own "page". It reads as follows:

"To those who now have 28 packages of pasta. To those who are searching the black market for hand sanitizer. To those who are walking around with a face mask. And to those who are planning to flee with their kids, out from a coronavirus infected area: Never again look down on people who are fleeing from war or famine."

At first those words spoke to me about how far humanity has drifted away from Christ's commandment that; "You love your neighbour as yourself" (Matthew 22:39). However I could also hear God speaking through those same words and saying this is an opportunity for Christian Witness, an opportunity to transform our environments for Christ. Now is the time, the time for our good deeds to be seen in the world, the time for our voices of Christian love and compassion to be heard in the world, and also a time for us to be recognised, as not being of, or subscribing to, the ways of the world. You see when people are afraid, afraid of the unknown or of what lies ahead for them and for their families, it's easy for them, out of fear, to begin displaying selfish, at times even aggressive behaviour towards others. Some might call it, an instinct of self-preservation.

As Christians with a mission to make Jesus known in the world, there so many ways that we can help our neighbours get through these difficult and fearful times. Take a look around, pray and try to discern who and where God is calling you to show love to your neighbour. Perhaps they are seniors, those with disabilities, the immuno-compromised, perhaps even Moms with young children who are experiencing difficulties coping, whoever they are, give them a call, let them know of your concern for them and ask how you can be of help. In particular let them know you are praying for them and for all your neighbours at this time, as we demonstrate our love for them by bringing their troubles to God in prayer. Perhaps this may also be an opportunity to share your faith in Jesus Christ, the source of your own hope in what lies ahead.

3. Former Spiritual Director Rev. Stephanie Pellow

The Joy of the Lord is Your Strength

My name is Stephanie Pellow and I made my Cursillo in May of 1978. I sat at the Table of St. Catherine. I was under the age of 30 and had only been attending church regularly for five years after a hiatus of a few years. In the two congregations with which I had contact, I observed many Christians. For many there seemed to be a peace and comfort about their faith. Some, like me had a burning desire to learn more about our faith. Earnest, hard-working, devoted, sincere, faithful, and hopeful are other descriptions that I might have assigned to my fellow parishioners of the time. Joyfulness, though was not something I saw in them. It was at Cursillo where I first encountered joy.

Where did that joy come from? For me, it came from the realization that I was truly loved, truly beloved of God. Truly loved but not any more or any less than everyone else. I found this to be remarkably freeing. But as St. Paul argues in various places in his writing, the response to gaining that freedom in Christ is to enter into servitude to him. It sounds like an oxymoron but it isn't. Freedom in Christ draws you away from the snares of earthly life but requires you to seek to make life better for others for Christ's sake. I wanted to share the new joy and freedom I had found.

In 1984, after taking on various other weekend roles, I was asked to coordinate a Women's Cursillo Weekend. I chose a passage from Nehemiah as the theme. It comes from the part of the story where the people have gathered to celebrate the rebuilding of Jerusalem after they returned from exile in Babylon. Ezra read the Book of the Law to them at the Watergate. They all prayed. Some wept and some cheered. Ezra pleaded with them to be joyful, to embrace the new and let go of their precious memories of what had been before. He said, "This day is holy to the Lord. Do not mourn or weep......do not be grieved for the joy of the Lord is your strength." Our Cursillo Weekend in 1984 was joyful. Like many Cursillo Weekends, there were some glitches – there is no group picture – but in the main it was full of joy. I have seen and experienced that same joy in the Lord on many weekends and Cursillo gatherings since. And even more significant, I sense and experience that joy each day that I live with the love of God held precious in my heart.

One of my great joys has been to serve as Spiritual Director of Cursillo in Niagara/Huron for the past 10 years. It has been a joy to meet and learn from so many brothers and sisters in Christ. It has been a joy to work with you to bring others to joy. Thank you for allowing me that privilege. As you go forward with Rev. Brian Galligan as your Spiritual Director may you continue to grow in love and be helpful to many others who through the vehicle of Cursillo come to experience the love of the Creator fully, to walk with Jesus as friend and brother and sense the Spirit active in their lives.

8. Pray for **those waking up each day to fallout caused by COVID-19**, that they would reach out to you, Lord. We pray for people look earnestly for you, because we know their desire to seek you will have come from you, and we know you will meet them. We pray for those whose businesses and livelihoods are ruined by the halt in many sectors of the economy. We pray for those who may lose jobs and salaries. For each one, we pray new beginnings with you walking by their side.

7. Telling God's story shared by Terry Burk

Excerpts from Divine Beauty. The Invisible Embrace By John O'Donohue

Colour is the language of light; it adorns the earth with beauty. Through colour light brings its passion, kindness and imagination to all things: pink to granite, green to leaves, blue to ocean, yellow to dawn. Light is not simply a functional brightness that clears space for visibility. Perhaps of all the elements, light has the most refined imagination; it is never merely a medium.
